## Apimondia demands full impact assessment before any EU pesticide reform proceeds

**The world beekeeping body warns that the European Commission's proposed pesticide Omnibus reform may silently weaken health and environmental safeguards – without evidence, and without an impact assessment.**

**Brussels / Rome** – Apimondia, the International Federation of Beekeepers' Associations, is calling on EU institutions to halt progress on the **Commission's Food and Feed Safety Simplification Omnibus package until** a rigorous, independent impact assessment has been completed and made public. The organisation warns that the proposal, [presented in December 2025](#), risks rolling back decades of hard-won protections for human health, pollinators, and biodiversity.

The alarm was sounded publicly following a [Dutch parliamentary hearing on 26 March 2026](#), at which **Klaus Berend, Director for Food Safety at the Commission's DG SANTE**, was asked by MP Inèš Kostić what evidence existed to demonstrate that the reform would not reduce the current level of protection for citizens and nature. According to a report by [PAN Europe published on 8 April 2026](#), no such evidence was provided. The Commission cannot presently show that its own proposal preserves existing safeguards.

PAN Europe has further raised concerns that the Omnibus package could undermine the regular reassessment of approved active substances – a cornerstone mechanism that allows regulators to act when new scientific evidence emerges. The proposal was introduced without an impact assessment, and a legal opinion cited by PAN Europe alleges it is inconsistent with the [Commission's own Better Regulation Guidelines and with Treaty principles](#).

For Apimondia, these are not procedural technicalities. Bees and other pollinators are directly exposed to the pesticide substances regulated under EU law. Weakening the

frequency or trigger conditions for safety reviews, or extending approval periods without commensurate scrutiny, translates directly into heightened risk for pollinator populations that underpin European food production and ecosystem health. Any reform that changes how long approvals remain in force or how reassessments are initiated must be subject to the highest level of evidential and legal scrutiny.

#### APIMONDIA'S CALLS TO ACTION

- The European Parliament, the Council, and Member States **must require a full, published impact assessment** before the Omnibus package advances.
- No legislative change may reduce the level of protection established under existing EU pesticide law.
- The precautionary principle must be applied wherever scientific uncertainties remain.
- **Priority** must be given to effective, fully resourced implementation of the current regulatory framework.
- **Citizens** are urged to sign the [European petition on pesticide regulation](#) made available by PAN Europe.
